
The themes on each table were as follows:

- Green Infrastructure

After 20 mins, attendees were offered the opportunity to move tables or continue their discussions.


The feedback provided on each table is summarized on the next three pages.

### Feedback (Built form)



- Solar panels by developer? Or Homeowners? Could be a mish-mash
- Safe, affordable housing
- Windows 2<sup>nd</sup> views are really important
- Green visible, accessible
- Health centre will it be occupied
- GP services, therapy provision etc.
- X-ray unit near the playing fields
- Community infrastructure
- STC will it connect to the hospital in Harlow?
- Centre doesn't look anything like a village a central square
- A plaza/meeting space not windswept
- How can community exploit the public spaces?
- Need benches (the right sort!!)
- · Fountains where children can play!
- A destination... coming down the hill
- Shopping
- What about food shopping, getting the bags home?
- Postal deliveries and drones
- · Great health centre delivered in Ware
- · 3D views "everything just looks grey!"
- Will there be a care home?
- People are dying, 3 funerals a week...
- Needs a name, not Village 1
- Bin storage (and dog poo bins)
- School size... expansion capacity? Will it fill up... kids being bussed out?
- Anthony says see Poundbury solutions to street character, absorbing car parking e.g. courts, not 1970s style!

### Feedback (Built form)



- Modern or traditional?
- Variety "but not true traditional"
- It's the quality of the build that makes it inc. brick stock
- Front gardens not to be paved over for parking
- "a modern village" needs careful thought not defaulting to standard regulations
- Bloor and Miller look at Terlings Park (benefits from a mature landscape setting)
- Townhouses with front gardens
- What we all want is for the space to be the best it can be
- What about accessible homes for people with disabilities?
- Community walks around Terlings Park, looped paths
- Consolidate green into meaningful spaces vs.. Dead grass at the end of a dry summer
- Movement and transport hierarchy of public routes developers need to understand which are most important – especially at edge of village 1
- Streets should be asymmetric not boulevards


# Feedback (Green infrastructure)

- Water feature in centre to encourage local wildlife
- Health and wellbeing spaces for all
- Making space for girls, neurodiversity, all abilities and ages
- Play spaces for all and seating
- SUDS and landscape integration
- Heritage (local) effect on character of place
- Noise mitigation esp. on southern edge
- Embed food production into all green spaces
- Create a green movement with a brand/logo
- Forest school
- Wild spaces for bees etc.
- Dog litter bins
- Lighting timed (illegible)
- · Grassland rather than patio and hard standing
- Green privacy screens through using trees etc. taking into account light needs
- Hedges not boulevards
- Retain existing trees particularly between existing villages



# Feedback (Access & Movement)

- Understanding wider pedestrian and cycle links and connectivity as part of SLMP
- Referencing the SLMP Design Code
- Cunnington Grove no footpaths/narrow/shared road opportunity
- Clustering of big trees along the primary street and less manicured hedging
- Asymmetrical footpath and verge arrangement more variety
- More variety in precedent imagery tighter streets (streets as spaces) in low density areas (more landscaping)
- Safe routes for key desire lines
- Lighting and overlooking
- Bus stops real timetables/printed and seating
- Proximity of elderly care home close to mobility hub + STC + schools
- Avoiding/discouraging large parking areas making sure they are broken up
- Overlooking of rear parking courts close to homes
- Crossover plan needed to show consistency of routes and priority of movement
- Footpaths links commuter (formal), leisure (less formal), dog walking, destination in itself
- Prescriptive pedestrian/cycle routes width, integrated into landscape
  - Lighting (safe)
  - Adaptive commuter routes
  - Existing of bus stops
- Parking character
  - More communal centre more private at edge
  - Welcome a bespoke approach
- Local centre
  - Parking courts difficult to design well
  - Frontage
  - Courts overlooked
  - Every space landscaped
- Road corridors
  - More naturalistic
  - Not manufactured environment
  - Variation of set back distances
  - Asymetric better
  - Acknowledgement that design is 20mph but needs to be enforced
  - Trees



#### Feedback wordcloud




#### Next steps
